# **TIME FOR REST** by Fr. Philip

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their *multitude.* And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. Genesis 2:1-3

wo years ago we began adding a new section to our weekly service leaflet. It's called What is the Reason? Understanding Episcopal Liturgy. Each week I devote a few sentences or paragraphs to answering some sort of question about our worship service. These articles have been popular with our members, and I learn more about each topic as I do research for the answers.

The strange thing is that I never considered adding such a feature to our weekly service leaflet until two years ago. The idea just never occurred to me until the middle of July, 2022. The idea came to my mind as I was hiking through the Jungfrau region of Switzerland. I had come down from the high mountain regions and was walking through the town of Lauterbrunnen.

It was a beautiful summer day, a Sunday, and there were throngs of people walking through the town. I had spent nine weeks travelling through Europe, and this was my ninth Sunday away from St. Paul's. Not only that, this was my ninth Sunday of not attending church, of being in art museums, hiking mountain trails, and sitting in coffee shops instead of being in church.

As you may know, attendance at church services is much lower in most parts of Europe than in the United States. I was not surprised to see that the streets were packed with people, very few of them having any thought of attending a church service. I sat down at a picnic bench to eat my lunch and watched the people go by. That's when I began to grasp a simple fact of our world. Few of the people walking past me would understand much of anything about our worship services if they happened to step into my normal Sunday place: St. Paul's.

During the next days, I began to think about the fact that, even in the United States, where church attendance is higher, most people outside of the Episcopal, Lutheran, and Roman Catholic Churches would not have much understanding of our worship practices. By the time I landed back in Syracuse I was thinking about the fact that many people in our congregation might not have much understanding of the reasons for our worship practices. I realized it might be helpful to offer some explanations.

I'm pretty sure I would not have come to this realization if I hadn't taken some time for rest. I had to stop working for a while in order to understand one of the most important things about my 'work'.

The same thing is true for you. Whether your routine involves travelling to an office to work for eight hours, or spending an hour or two laboring in your garden, or attending the weekly rehearsal of your music group, each of us needs times when we take a break from our routines and rest.

In Holy Scripture we learn that rest is sacred time. The world around us gives us the message we are valued for what we do, for what we accomplish, but in our church community we tell a different story. Each one of us is valued for our being. As a parent loves their child just for being there with them, God loves you simply for your being, for your presence in the world. Following God's example, we strive to be the community where each person is treasured simply for being present.

# LOOKING AHEAD TO SEPTEMBER by Fr. Philip

t's been more than three years since we have conducted a congregational survey. Your Executive Ministry Team (Marion, Joe, Doug, Liz, Kira, Jeanne, Laurie, Betsy, and Philip) decided this September might be a good time to ask for your thoughts about life at St. Paul's.



We are hard at work crafting 30 questions to ask our members for a comprehensive survey of Worship, Formation, Fellowship, Pastoral Care, and Mission & Service activities at St. Paul's.

Some of the questions are practical, such as, where would you like to hold fellowship hour when all of the construction is finished? Some of the questions are more subjective and spiritual in nature, such as, which parts of worship are consistently meaningful for you? Some of the questions are multiple choice and some are open response.

The survey is intended to be completed anonymously, although you will find a place at the end where you have the option of adding your name to your survey. The survey will be available in an online format and in a paper and pencil format. For our lay leaders and our staff, it's a large task to create a comprehensive survey such as this, so we will be publishing our St. Paul's 2024 Survey in place of the September edition of *The Courier*.

I trust you will devote 20-30 minutes to read and answer the questions on the survey when it is published in September. It might be most helpful to think of your responses, not as your votes on any particular issue, but as <u>your story</u> of <u>your</u> experience at St. Paul's. When we have collected all of these unique, personal stories your Executive Ministry Team (Marion, Joe, Doug, Liz, Kira, Jeanne, Laurie, Betsy, and Philip) will read each and every one and look for patterns and information in the responses. We'll report back to you about what we have learned. Then we'll use this information to help guide many of our decisions for the next 2-5 years.



## JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT by Joe Moorman

t the recent Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis, 61% of delegates voted in favor of a proposal to expand restrictions on women in church leadership. This amendment to the denomination's constitution did not meet the required two-thirds majority threshold for passage and their constitution remained unchanged. Their proposal, to me, is

not in the spirit of St. Paul's letter to the Galatians that says "...there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:28)

In contrast to the Southern Baptists, look at the back page of our weekly service leaflet. You will see the names of women at St. Paul's who fill leadership roles vital to our ongoing mission of teaching, serving, and celebrating Christ. These include:

As you look around the church and Parish House and see construction underway, or watch the video updates on the website, realize that the Open Doors Project would not be up and running without the leadership of a group of highly talented women. Three in particular have devoted many hundreds of hours to the effort: Rebecca Livengood initiated and led the task force for ten years, Cathy Wolff is co-chair of our highly successful capital campaign, and Betsy Elkins, in addition to her other roles, is the de facto leader for St. Paul's as we negotiate all aspects of the construction process.



## OPEN DOORS CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE by Cathy Wolff



ur Open Doors Capital Campaign is rapidly reaching its conclusion. In just 6 weeks we raised \$91,750! Most of that is thanks to the astounding generosity of St. Paul's members. Not only did we meet the \$50,000 challenge, but we exceeded that goal and raised a total of \$83,425 by the deadline of June 30<sup>th</sup> - \$33,425 of that since May 17<sup>th</sup>! That earned us an additional \$50,000 from the loyal supporters of St. Paul's for four generations who issued the challenge.

Our partnership with A Tiny Home for Good (ATHFG) generated a \$5,000 grant from the Richard Mather Fund. Andrew Lunetta, ATHFG's executive director, spoke at Christ Church in Manlius in May. As their rector The Rev. Tim Hannon said in a letter to the people of St. Paul's Church in Syracuse, NY, "He (Andrew) lit the fire of the Holy Spirit in us, and our church wanted to find some way to help your wonderful ministry with Andrew." They sent us a check for \$3,275 that represented donations directed to us by members of their parish and a tithe to their Lenten Fish Fry proceeds. He concluded, "Please know that you are also in our prayers. Thank you so much for your important work. You are a light to the world in what you do!"

# SUMMER WORSHIP AT ST. PAUL'S by Fr. Philip

ere are a few notes about our worship this summer at St. Paul's:

- We are meeting for a single worship service at 9:30 from June 30 through September 1.
- I will be away for six Sundays, from July 21-August 25.

• From August 6-11 I will be attending a Continuing Education retreat in Pennsylvania.

The rest of the weeks will be vacation time for me.

- If you've been counting my vacation time this year you will notice there are two extra weeks of vacation; these are weeks of leave time I was not able to take during 2023. 


## OPEN DOORS CONSTRUCTION UPDATE by Betsy Elkins

he June Courier provided a comprehensive reference for Open Doors including a construction review and update. This article will describe what has happened since June and what we expect will be happening in the coming months. Work is happening in many areas simultaneously and will speed up as the summer progresses. This is a many faceted and complex project and it is coming together! Be sure you are watching the short videos we are posting on our webpage to document our construction progress.

<u>Elevator</u> construction is a huge part of this project: The elevator tower constructed of concrete blocks has been completed. The construction of the actual elevator takes 11 weeks to manufacture (off site) and 3 weeks to install.

<u>Montgomery Street lobby</u> work has begun. A new (lower) floor is being constructed.



The lobby and elevator shaft as of July 2

<u>New bathrooms</u> are taking shape. The floors for the new bathrooms adjacent to the Sargent Foyer have been lowered and new floors have been framed and plywood subfloor installed. Rough plumbing and electric are currently being installed.

<u>Window restoration</u>, another huge part of this project continues. All window sashes have been repaired or fabricated and are waiting for paint. Seven of the nine French doors that face Montgomery Street have been fabricated.



Exterior masonry work is ongoing and about half completed.

<u>Roofing</u> will start in July and will take about 40 days to complete.

New fire alarm, security, entrance, and camera systems will

be installed throughout our buildings. These new systems will greatly improve our current systems and allow for expansion into A Tiny Home for Good spaces as well as the third-floor apartments. Plans (drawings) for these new systems are currently underway and will be submitted to the City of Syracuse for the appropriate permit to complete this work.

The third-floor apartments will be renovated by Drulyk construction as they work on the rest of Open Doors. 7

## APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS FROM THE NAN DORR ENDOWMENT FUND

The 2023 earnings amount from this Fund - \$6,216.85 is now available. This Fund was set up in 2011 by the Dorr Family in memory of Nan Dorr, a much-loved member of St. Paul's, who died in 2009. The fund is devoted exclusively to the Women of St. Paul's to be used for an annual project or projects for which members of the congregation are asked to submit proposals annually. A small committee is responsible for deciding on the most appropriate projects submitted and these then go to the Finance Committee and finally to the Vestry for their approval.

We are now asking members of the congregation to submit any project(s) they wish to propose and to send them in writing, with detailed specifics of costs, and the name of the person responsible for overseeing the project. We will only consider those items that are special and unusual, and which would not normally be part of the church budget. We also feel that they would be something that Nan Dorr herself would have liked.


The deadline for submission is Monday, July 29, 2024

# GENERAL CONVENTION by Fr. Philip

- he 81st General Convention of the Episcopal Church was held in Louisville, KY from June 23-28. Here are few notes about the results of the gathering:
- Bishop Sean Rowe (Diocese of NW Pennsylvania) was elected as our new Presiding Bishop. Bishop Rowe will serve a term of nine years, until 2033. Bishop Rowe was elected on the first ballot, and is the youngest person ever elected to the post of Presiding Bishop.
- The state of Wisconsin has been divided into three diocese\* for about 140 years. For the past three years the three diocese have been in conversation about the possibility of joining together again as a single diocese. The reunion was approved by the three diocese in March, and by General Convention in Louisville.
- The Episcopal Church created a mission region to serve Episcopalians in the Navajo regions of Utah, New Mexico, and Arizona in 1978, called Navajoland. At this General Convention the Navajoland Region was elevated to the status of being a *Missionary Diocese*. This allows members of the Navajoland Missionary Diocese to elect their own Bishop. The elevation of Navajoland to Missionary Diocese status might be an intermediate step toward the creation of a Navajoland Diocese.
- The state of Michigan has been divided into four diocese for many years. Two of the four diocese, the Diocese of Eastern Michigan and the Diocese of Western Michigan have been exploring the possibility of merging into a single diocese for five years. Their request to be allowed to merge was approved by General Convention.
- Julia Ayala Harris was elected to a second term as President of the House of Deputies.
- General Convention passed a resolution in support of advancing toward full communion with the United Methodist Church. The United Methodists passed a similar resolution at their nation meeting on April 30. Currently, the Episcopal Church is in full communion (meaning clergy are mutually exchangeable) with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Moravian Church,

#### and five other denominations.

• Three resolutions addressing the crisis in Gaza were adopted by General Convention.

\* There are two options of words for the plural form of diocese. The author is following an Episcopal tradition where the term 'diocese' can apply to one or more than one diocese. (This is similar to the way the word 'deer' can apply to one deer or to many deer.) In this tradition there is a difference in the pronunciation. A single diocese is pronounced 'die-oh-siss'. Plural diocese are pronounced 'die-oh-seize'.



## THE REV. SARAH PALSMA ELECTED VICE-PRESIDENT OF by Phyllis Palsma & Fr. Philip RCA GENERAL SYNOD

he Reverends Phyllis and Nolan Palsma are ordained Ministers of Word and Sacrament in the Reformed Church in America (RCA). They both retired from active ministry a little over a year ago and became part of the St. Paul's family after moving to their new home in Liverpool. While actively participating in life at St. Paul's, they continue to maintain their ties to the Reformed Church in America.

This past June, the General Synod of the RCA met in Tucson, AZ. The annual RCA General Synod gathering is similar to the Episcopal Church Tri-annual General Convention. Phyllis attended as the appointed Chaplain for this General Synod. Nolan attended as a guest. Their daughter, Rev. Sarah Palsma, co-pastor of New Hope Community Church (RCA) in Powell Ohio since 2011 was a minister delegate.


Like the Episcopal Church, the RCA is in a time of discernment and restructuring. Capable leaders of a younger generation are needed to lead the church into the future. The General Synod affirmed that leadership need when Sarah Palsma was elected as vice president for the coming year.

It is truly an honor for someone to be entrusted with this role of denominational leadership. Needless to say, parental pride was evident as Phyllis and Nolan watched their daughter stand before the Synod as the youngest female vice-president elected in the history of the RCA. The vice president is typically the sole nominee for president the following year, meaning Sarah will likely preside over the 2026 General Synod. The next two years of General Synod will continue to be historically significant as restructuring

recommendations are considered and implemented.

In her acceptance speech, Sarah honored RCA ministers who have shaped her, including her parents, whose names had just been read in a resolution for clergy who retired in 2023.

As she closed. Sarah returned to a



Scripture passage she cited in her speech as a vice presidential candidate. "Let us not grow weary in the work that we're called to do, for we will reap the harvest if we do not give up. (Galatians 6:9) Thanks be to God!"
