How Do We Know When and Where God is Working?

Who has seen the wind?

Neither you nor I:

But when the trees bow down their heads

The wind is passing by.

ome people seem to easily and frequently point to specific events as part of God's work in the world. They might tell me, "This happened because God wanted it to happen." I'm not so confident in our ability to identify God's actions.

In one of the most beautiful poems found in scripture, Isaiah 55, we read "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord." God's ideas and ways of doing things are transcendent: they are above our intelligence. It isn't easy for us to know and understand

God's way of doing things or the way God is working in the world.

Yet Jesus promises the disciples that the Holy Spirit will remain with them, working alongside them. We sometimes catch little glimpses of activities that seem like they might be a sign God's Spirit is working alongside us. I had the impression that I was witnessing some work of the Holy Spirit a few weeks ago,



during a Zoom video meeting. That was a surprise!

St. Paul's Bicentennial Steering Committee held their second meeting a few weeks ago. Eight members of the Steering Committee are leading one of the eight task forces. Each task force has a specific assignment, a list of tasks to be accomplished.

In many cases, this is how the work gets done at St. Paul's. We organize teams of members to work on specific tasks, and the work of each team is coordinated with the work of other teams through an 'umbrella group', like the Bicentennial Steering Committee, or the Worship Ministry Team. These efforts are overseen by your Vestry, because St. Paul's Vestry is your elected board, chosen by you to make final decisions about financial matters and most other activities in the church.

This has proved to be a creative, effective process for us at St. Paul's, as we encourage the leadership and ideas of many different people. But let's also notice that all of this is about us, putting our ideas into practice. Where does God fit into this process?

I noticed several things happening during the March meeting of the Bicentennial Steering Committee that made the hour long meeting feel like a holy time, or a sacred space:

- People were making space for others to speak; they were not speaking over or interrupting one another.
- People were listening attentively as individuals with different backgrounds, experiences, and perspectives were sharing their ideas.
- Individual leaders articulated new possibilities, ideas that had not been considered before and were not part of any of our task lists.

The presence of all three of these gave me the distinct impression that God's spirit was somehow doing her work among us.

As we work together through many challenges and possibilities in the coming months, we strive to be doing God's work, working alongside God's spirit. We start by remembering Paul's words to the Corinthians: "Let everything you do be done in love."

Honoring the Safety and Dignity of Everyone at St. Paul's

t St. Paul's, we strive to follow the example of our Savior Jesus Christ in welcoming all people who enter our big red doors for worship on any given Sunday. Here, we endeavor to love God and neighbor by offering a safe space for everyone to feel cherished, valued, and loved.



To ensure that everyone feels safe, a group of about 25 leaders of St. Paul's participated in an all-day Safe Church Training led by the Rev. Pat Kinney, rector of St. John's in Speedsville and St. Mark's in Candor, in the Brewster Room on Saturday, March 8. Participants included Father Philip, St. Paul's staff members, ministry team leaders, Vestry members, Wardens, and members of the Executive Ministry Team.

Our training began with theological background, based on 1 Corinthians 12:12, 26-27. "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it." As a community of Christ, we are stewards of each other's well-being. In the words of retired presiding Bishop Michael Curry, living in a beloved community is about creating a holy place where all are loved, not just within the physical boundaries of a church, but in the wider world and among the whole human family.

Covering subjects such as Healthy Boundaries, Inclusion, Power and Relationships, and Abuse and Neglect, the presenter helped St. Paul's leaders explore how together with God, we can further a culture of safety and inclusion for all people (and not just for those who bravely enter our doors). The Healthy Boundaries section of our training covered the importance of maintaining physical, emotional and behavioral boundaries. Bishop Curry's introduction to the Inclusion component highlighted our Baptismal Covenant, in which we promise, with God's help, to seek to serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves, and to respect the dignity of every human being.

Because power and authority come from God, we were encouraged to use our power and authority to build up the body of Christ in the module on Power and Relationships. As followers of Jesus, we must use our authority for humble service and use our power, as Jesus did, by sharing it with the wider world. While the Abuse and Neglect portion of Safe Church Training was the most difficult, it outlined four actions to take if we suspect abuse and neglect: interrupt, ensure safety, notify, and report.

Keeping our Safe Church Training in mind, Father Philip is working with St. Paul's Executive Ministry Team, Wardens and Vestry to develop policies and procedures that help ensure the safety of everyone who not only enters our big red doors, but also those who visit our Open Pantry and otherwise interact with us.

If you're involved with a St. Paul's Ministry Team, ask your team leader how you can help further our goal of being a safe place where God's vision for beloved community becomes a reality. HolyWeek

oly Week is a time when we strive to move closer to, and gain understanding of, the God who sustains us and guides us at all times, including during our most difficult times. Here is a brief overview:


Palm Sunday ~ April 13th at 10 a.m. We commemorate the joy of the crowd of people greeting Jesus for

his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Our members take roles in reading the Passion Gospel of Luke. This is the most somber Sunday of the year as we remember Jesus' betrayal, his arrest, trial, crucifixion, and death.

• Maundy Thursday ~ April 17th at 5:30 p.m. This is a liturgy about the most important, most basic question: what is the meaning of love? We gather in the Nave, sing hymns, hear the story of the Last Supper from the Gospel of John, participate in a ritual of humility and service, and celebrate communion. Then we engage in a ritual of symbolic emptying, as all of the sacramental elements are removed from the altar. The service ends in silence as we carry the consecrated bread and wine out of the Nave and place them in a special cupboard in the Chapel.

 Good Friday ~ April 18th at 5:30 p.m. The Nave and the Chancel feel empty and desolate. This is the only day of the church year when there is no celebration of communion. Through the Good Friday liturgy we hold in a sacred space the

losses, betrayals and griefs of our own lives as we hear again the story of Jesus' betrayal, crucifixion and death. We listen to scripture readings, pray the solemn collects, and sing "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?"



• Easter Sunday ~ April 20th at 10 a.m. In the brightness of the new day we come face to face with the great mystery: God's love is stronger than death, stronger than our mistakes, grief, and sadness.



Why St. Paul's? A Tiny Home for Good

I ended my search for a new church at St Paul's thinking the same thoughts Carolyn Grieb had spoken a few years before me "I can't believe you people have been here all this time, and I didn't know about it" (From Fr. Philip sermon 2/9). I hope this article allows us to step back from the day to day work of Open Doors and A Tiny Home for Good and appreciate the community we have here, and the magnificence of what we are about to accomplish.

Construction Update, More Good News

e are starting to see increased construction activity again around St. Paul's. The permit for our new fire and security alarm systems was granted by the City of Syracuse in February and by the time you read this report the rough work (lots of wires) for these systems should be completed. The final installation work will be completed once all the walls are in and painted.

With the return of warmer weather, we will see work on the new west entrance to the parking lot including the construction of a small portico; roofing over the parish house can be completed. The areas around the elevator will be finished, bathrooms finished, and new flooring installed in the Sargent foyer and the Montgomery Street lobby and in the bathrooms and kitchen. A new window will be installed in the kitchen to bring in more light. A group of St. Paul's painters will paint the kitchen walls before the new floor is installed.



Father Philip's closet construction crew will continue its weekly work on building a new closet at the end of the

Hansen Dining Room that will provide much needed storage space (tables, chairs, church archives, etc.)

It will be a busy spring construction wise as we work to wrap up this project this summer. (Keep your fingers crossed and pray a bit about this.) The Construction Management Task Force will be working on plans for "putting things back together." You will be hearing more about ways you can help with various tasks including rehanging artwork and washing kitchen items that are currently in the dining room and covered with construction dust!

As this work continues, we will resume our update videos to show you what is happening. Stay tuned, stay patient and stay grateful that we will soon have a completed project to enhance our ministry together.

To Pewholders:

Pews will be held for pewholders until after the Processional Hymn, at which time all seats in the Church will be free. Pews will be reserved for those pewholders who find if they are compelled to be late, if they will notify the Parish Office.

Those renting sittings, whenever they expect to be absent, will assist in extending the hospitality of the church if they will notify the Parish Office by telephone previous to 10:45 a.m. on Sunday, so that the ushers may use the seats before the Processional Hymn.

Ushers will gladly seat visitors and strangers as promptly as possible. All seats are free at 5 o'clock Evensong.






































YMCA Ministry—February Social

Many thanks to Betsy Elkins for making delicious coffee cakes.


A special thank you to DJ Igelsrud for taking memorable photos of the social.



Evenings (after 5:00 p.m.) and Sundays, you may park anywhere in the lot.



Monday-Saturday: Do not park in the numbered spots until after 5:00 p.m. Downtown workers have paid to park in our lot. We have signed a contract with them that they are guaranteed their parking place Monday through Saturday.



The construction workers who park around the dumpster, usually leave about 4:00 p.m. You can park there after 4:00 p.m. but your car may be blocked in.


