Advent: We Return

Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy?

Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food.

Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live.

Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while the Lord is near.

Isaiah 55:2-3 and 6

or each one of us, there are times of grief and times of resurrection, there are times of new growth and times of return. The calendar of the church year offers <u>seasons</u> for us to be immersed in these fundamental spiritual movements: returning to God, welcoming God's new work in our lives, confessing mistakes, acknowledging grief, and receiving the gift of God's forgiveness and love.

Of all the seasons, Advent is the season I look forward to the most. I hunger for a season when our focus is on returning to God.

During Advent we are encouraged to take on a few simple practices:

- Turning off some of the distractions, some of the noise, some of the bright lights.
- Lighting a candle and creating a space for listening and reflection.
- Taking a little extra time for spiritual practices that sustain you, such as prayer, reading, music, or time in nature.
- Giving a little less attention to our <u>doing</u>, and a little more attention to our <u>being</u>: being God's beloved children, being created in the image of God, being forgiven for mistakes we have made.

The season of Advent begins on Sunday, December 1st this year. Here are some things you might notice about Advent at St. Paul's:

- We take a break from part of our normal schedule of meetings.
- Purple is our color for the season. Purple is the color of royalty, traditionally worn by queens and kings.
- The altar frontal and other colorful elements are purple because we are in a season of preparing for the birth of a child who is our king.
- We hold our seasonal Lessons & Carols service on the first Sunday of Advent, December 1st. This is different from a <u>Christmas</u> Lessons & Carols service; it's a

time to 'shift our gears' down to a slower, more reflective pace.



Our self-published 'Little Book of Advent Prayers' is available for you. It includes short readings and questions for reflections for each day of the season. You can find copies in the entry area of the church. With prayers for rest, health, and wholeness for you in this season of return,

Each day I begin my prayers with this sentence: "You are God; I am dust." Lately, I've been feeling more like dust than usual. On October 9th I experienced an injury to my back, and it's taking a very long time to heal.

Some of you may know that on October 5th we received the tragic news of the death of our dear friend, the Rev. John Rohde. During the week that followed, as Jim and I worked through the preparations and extra work of that time, I spent a little bit too much time in my chair, crouched over my desk. In the process I injured my back.

Since October 9th I have taken steps to help my back heal, and I have made some progress towards this goal. One of the difficulties for me is that I am not able to sit for long periods of time, and standing for many hours a day has brought additional challenges.

I ask for your patience as I try to recover. My inability to sit for long periods makes it difficult for me to drive and to do some aspects of my work, such as pastoral care visits. I am making some adjustments to my work schedule so that I am able to take time for exercises and stretches I've been given. You may notice days when I am wearing stretchy yoga pants at work; that's so I can take a few minutes on the soft carpeting of the Hadley Chapel, stretching out my back. Please keep me in your prayers.



Open Doors Construction Update

f you are around the church during the week, you will see and hear the noise of construction. And that is music to our ears to know that progress is happening in many areas:

- The opening for the new west entrance from the parking lot has been cut and pillars to hold the portico over the entrance have been constructed. (Look for another video hosted by Doug Mouncey describing this work on our website)
- The roofing work over the chapel area is now underway and we anticipate all the roofing work (which included some unexpected abatement work) to be completed before serious winter sets in. While this work is being done you may not enter via the chapel door.
- The design plans for a new "state of the art" fire alarm and security systems have been reviewed by our architect and will be sent to the city soon for permitting
- Work on the third-floor apartments is well underway.
- The elevator parts have arrived and the elevator will be installed in the coming weeks.

We are offering tours of the construction areas after services on Sunday once a month. If this doesn't work for you ask Betsy or Doug for a tour at another time.



A Tiny Home for Good Update

Representatives for St. Paul's on this task force are David Morgan, Doug Mouncey, Philip Major, Amy Mangram, and Betsy Elkins. This group has been meeting on and off for over 2 years and the atmosphere continues to be collegial and cooperative. The benefits for St Paul's and A Tiny Home for Good remain strong and clear.

ATHFG has received a commitment for funding from the Dormitory Authority of NYS. Once the lease is signed ATHFG may begin demolition work on the second floor of the parish house as St. Paul's wraps up the Open Doors project by mid-2025.

A First Look at St. Paul's 2024 Survey

n September and October sixty-two of our members completed a 32-question survey about all aspects of our parish life, including worship, mission & service, pastoral care, fellowship, and formation activities. St. Paul's Executive Ministry Team spent 90 minutes making an initial review of the results of the survey at the beginning of

November. We expect it will take several hours of additional work to read, digest, and summarize the results of the data for all six sections of the survey. We plan to present reports about the various sections of the survey beginning with the February *Courier*.

For the time being, it might be helpful for you to know the kinds of information we are seeing in the data.



Here are examples from three different parts of the survey: worship, fellowship, and mission & service:

Worship: We asked a question about what portion of the hymns are familiar to you. 33% of respondents indicated they were familiar with half, or less than half, of the hymns sung during Sunday worship. 67% of respondents indicated they were familiar with most or all of the hymns.

Fellowship: We asked a question about our members' preferred location for after-church fellowship ('Coffee Hour') following the conclusion of construction. 69% of respondents indicated they would prefer to hold Coffee Hour in the Brewster Room or Hansen Dining Room. 10% preferred holding Coffee Hour in the Nave. 20% were open to a variety of locations.

Mission & Service: We asked a question about the variety of ways members support *The Open Pantry.* 68% of respondents indicated that they bring food to St. Paul's to help stock *The Open Pantry.* Thanks to everyone who took the time to complete St. Paul's 2024 Survey!






Senior Warden's Report

ou've heard our Junior Warden, Joe Moorman, making announcements after the Sunday service asking for candidates interested in running for Vestry or Warden, to be nominated at our annual meeting coming up at the end of January. But, do you know what the Vestry duties are, or why a Warden is different from a Vestry member? Let me see if I can help.



Our annual meeting is required by our By-Laws, and the main purpose is to hold elections for warden and vestry members. The Rector is the presiding officer of the meeting, unless otherwise delegated. It is the only time in any given year that all church members gather formally to do business.


The Rector, two Wardens and nine members of the Vestry comprise the Vestry and act in the capacity of trustees for the parish. The Vestry has custody and control of all of the

property and revenue of our parish, including the endowment. The Rector, Philip, is the Presiding Officer of the Vestry or, if the Rector is absent, the Senior Warden or, in the absence of the Senior Warden, the Junior Warden shall preside.

The Vestry has the power to fill vacancies occurring in the office of Warden or a member

of the Vestry by death, resignation (or otherwise than by expiration of term), or in the

event that that person becomes incapacitated and unable to act. This appointment(s)



but must be members of the parish. Annual performance reviews of the work we do, as a church and as individuals, are

necessary to determine the health of the parish, and will be done with a spirit of collective (mutual) responsibility for the diverse ministries of the church, and to a willingness to openly and honestly assess where our strengths are and where we can do better. Here are the three kinds of performance reviews to be conducted:

- A) Performance Review of St. Paul's Church: The Rector, in consultation with the wardens, is responsible for an annual review of selected church programs, directions, ministries, missions, and so on. Minimally to include the Vestry, this review seeks to celebrate our successes and build on them, and to identify our weaknesses and counter them. In a manner to be decided, the group determines the questions to be addressed, the methods by which the answers will be sought, and the mechanisms for the implementation. The importance of completing parish surveys!
- B) Paid Staff Performance Review: Calling on others whose confidential input may be useful, the Rector annually conducts a performance review of the individual paid staff persons.

C) Rector Performance Review: Annually, the wardens will conduct a performance review of selected elements of the Rector's ministry –using as necessary any Vestry-approved job description and letter of agreement which might help establish the church's expectations for that ministry.

St. Paul's has an additional layer of leadership, beyond our Vestry, called the Executive Ministry Team. The Executive Ministry Team (EMT) membership is comprised of the following members: the Rector, the senior and junior wardens, the Treasurer, the leader of the Pastoral Care Team, and the conveners of the four ministry teams: Worship, Christian Formation, Community/Fellowship, and Mission & Service teams.

The EMT shall:

- 1) provide a degree of oversight and evaluation of all programs and Processes,
- 2) coordinate the efforts of the several teams as needed,
- 3) initiate programs and processes that do not easily fall to any one of the other teams, and
- 4) engage in strategic planning on a church-wide basis. All other groups/committees (e.g. Altar Guild, Office Volunteers, Potluck Fridays) have been listed as associated with one or another of the teams described above a linkage of content and function rather than organization and structure.

I hope this helps answer any questions you may have. If not, please feel free to talk to me, Philip or Joe.

Junior Warden's Report

o you consider going to church an artistic experience? Think about it. You enter a graceful and elegant building and look at the work of stained glass artisans and our own floral arrangers. Beautiful music is played on the organ and sung by the choir - music written through the ages to the greater glory of God - and the congregation joins in singing hymns that can be comfortingly familiar or new and enlightening. It all enhances the spiritual aspects of worshipping at St. Paul's.



The worship experience at St. Paul's is good for the soul and it may be good for the body also. A 2019 study published in the British Medical Journal found that older adults who frequently engaged with the arts had a 31% lower risk of dying early. This association remained even after adjusting for factors like age, health, and wealth. Some examples of arts activities include: attending museums, art galleries, or exhibitions, going to the theater, attending concerts or opera, and creative writing, such as poetry. It's even been suggested by University College London researchers that just one art experience per month can extend your life by 10 years.



If you consider 'art' as anything that engages your senses, then coming to St. Paul's for a Sunday service certainly qualifies as art. Arts engagement can help people feel a greater sense of purpose in life, and, if you think about it, that is the feeling that many of us have when we leave St. Paul's after coffee hour. When I started writing the Junior Warden's Report for *The Courier* I didn't think I'd be giving out health tips, but I've learned that a healthy spiritual life can lead to a healthier physical one.



Pastoral Care

he last pastoral care meeting for 2024 happened on November 3rd, after the 10 o'clock service. A verbal invitation was offered during announcements and it was with great joy and thankfulness that I saw several new people interested in joining our group. I am certain God was equally pleased! Fr. Philip asked us to name how people at St. Paul's provide pastoral care to our members.

We identified 24 ways. I have placed them into groups as follows:

- Contacts with people: Sunday services; streaming; coffee hour; serving on the altar; ushers; choir; altar guild; bulletin; weekly Eblast; Courier
- Visiting people: home visits; nursing facilities; rides to appointments and luncheons; phone calls; text messages; emails;
- Outreach: birthday cards and anniversary as well as get-well cards; activities with the Y; food pantry; Haiti mission; Samaritan Center volunteers;
- · Children's Ministry with in-class lessons and joining the church service
- Extra prayer time during communion; Prayers for the People especially those on our urgent prayer list

Much of the caring for each other and others in our community, happens not only organized but often informally. It comes from members who want to help, stay connected, and treasure the closeness we have with God and each other.

New Business: Fr. Philip posted these questions in the bulletin for Sunday, November 3rd: What is the reason we have a prayer list at the back of the leaflet? Who are the people on this list? What should I do to add a name to the list?" Our pastoral care team maintains two prayer lists. The prayer list at the back of the leaflet is our "Urgent Prayer List". The people on this list have a need that might



be described as urgent; they have been recently diagnosed with a life-threatening illness, a serious injury or disability, or have been incarcerated or close to the end of life. This list also plays an important function in helping our congregation know when one of our active members is in special need of prayer. One of Philip's difficult decisions as priest of St. Paul's, is to discern when a person's medical condition falls under the category of 'urgent'. Shortening this 'urgent list' also gives us, in the pew, time to pray for people in our own lives to pray for them.

We have a second list, which we call our 'Continuing Prayer List'. The Continuing Prayer List includes people who have chronic or long-term conditions that affect their health and well-being. That list is not published but I will try to send it to our team members monthly.

There is a proposed timeline for staying on the Urgent Prayer List. The timing of that decision has not been made. If you know of someone you would like to have included on our Urgent Prayer List, please contact me, Kira Dirghalli, chair of our pastoral care team, or Fr. Philip.

A quote from James 3:17-18: "But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness sown in peace for those who make peace."

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

Be Safe Online—New and Old Scams to be Aware Of By Judy McAdoo-Pelton

adly, there are people that don't have good intentions and it's important keep yourself and your family safe. Some new scams have come up we wanted you to be aware of.

- 1. Church Directory: Scammers are trying to get ahold of our church directory. They pose as new parishioners that have been coming to St. Paul's and want to get our directory password for the website. Please do not give anyone you don't know personally as someone from St. Paul's, our directory or password for our online directory.
- 2. Free Piano: There is an email that goes around to churches, schools and individuals. In this email, it claims that 'her husband' has died and she wants to donate the piano to a church or school to honor her husband. Sadly, this is a scam and do not correspond with these people.
- 3. Doc-U-Sign: If you receive an email regarding a 'Doc U Sign:' do not open or click on anything unless it's from someone you know and trust and you are expecting it.
- 4. Word Document: Be very careful if you receive an email or text from someone wanting you to distribute a Word document. We had one a couple of weeks ago saying a prayer list was attached and to please forward it to everyone on our list. Do not open or forward. The Word document can be a trojan horse that wants to put a virus on your computer, destroying it.
- 5. You may have seen the texts from what looks like UPS or the postal service that says 'your order is being delayed and to please click on this link to correct it. Do not click on any links like these. Again, these are scams
- 6. If you get a mysterious text from someone you don't know saying something like "I'll meet you for lunch at noon" or 'What are you doing this weekend?", do not text them back. This too is a scam. I received another one this weekend asking me if I want to play a round of golf in San Francisco. When people respond, even to say, 'you have the wrong number', the scammer will begin a conversation being very friendly, apologizing and try to get the victim to tell them details about their life. This scam has led to people losing money or worse. Be safe out there.

7. Facebook Illegal content: This can happen to an organization, company or individual. You receive a notice that you are posting illegal content on Facebook and that you must click on a link to dispute it or your account will be reported and closed. Do not click on any links like this. Again, this is a scam. The church received another one last week and it was very convincing. One sure fire way to tell it's not from

META—Facebook, is to look at the email address it's coming from. In this instance, it wasn't Meta, but from a scammer named Kaylani.

Please be careful online and keep yourself and your family safe.


